

On 6 November 2009, the Inn welcomed 140 year 12/13 school students from nearly 60 state schools in Greater London to take part in the second annual seminar "So you want to be a Barrister?" The seminar is part of the Inn's larger Schools Project, run in collaboration with the National Education Trust, which also features an intensive Inner Temple Academy for five target schools and a biennial event for school teachers and career advisers.

The event aimed to increase school students' knowledge of what is involved in pursuing a career at the Bar, dispel misconceptions about the profession and to raise aspirations of participants. A panel of barristers practising in criminal law, family law, human rights and at the employed Bar spoke of their experiences and the challenges and opportunities life as a barrister presents. Later in the afternoon, students split into groups led by over 15 members of the Inn to engage in case law and rehearse a practice plea in mitigation. Speakers and panellists reiterated that the Bar is a profession based on meritocracy and open to all able candidates, regardless of their background.

Members who led these groups were extremely impressed by the competency and enthusiasm of the students. Equally, feedback from the students has been wholly positive. Many students spoke after the event about feeling inspired to consider a career at the Bar, not knowing that this had been a possibility beforehand.

The Education & Training Department would like to thank all those who helped at the event and, in particular, Simon O'Toole who led the activities and Leslie Thomas who chaired the panel.

DINNER TO THE UNIVERSITIES

LIBRARY NEVVS

CURRENT AWARENESS WEBLOG SURVEY

NEWS FROM THE GARDEN

ANDREA BRUNSENDORF, HEAD GARDENER

he Copenhagen Summit has filled the newspapers with relentless doom laden prophecies of the effect of climate change. At the same time the celebrations marking the publication of Charles Darwin's Origin of Species reminds us that we are where we are in the 21st century as a result of evolution, some of it 'natural', much man-made.

However, let's be more optimistic about the future than the media and a good place to start is in the Garden. After the mild autumn, the soil temperature is well above 7°C, which means we can still plant bulbs and spring bedding until the middle of January, and we can leave the tender plants in the ground for much longer. The majority of our tender species are in the Mediterranean border, which is far enough away from the buildings to avoid the wind tunnel effect and the slope enables the loamy soil to drain freely. I hope you have enjoyed the fabulous display of colour this autumn; the striking Salvia confertiflora from Brazil with red flower spikes, the Mexican Saliva leucantha, awash with extraordinarily fuzzy white-purple flowers, and the South African Leonotis leonurus, vibrant with orange whirls, which with luck will still be in flower in the New Year. We could gamble that the winter will be mild, but as an insurance policy against the

risk of a hard February frost, we will lift them before the end of January.

Last winter, I purposely did not take out Salvia uliginosa, Saliva guaranitica, Salvia 'Indigo Spire', they all proved hardy, so this year I shall test the robustness of various species from Brazil, Mexico, the Canary Islands and South Africa. I suspect they will survive the cold, but the English wet may prove their downfall. Three hundred years ago, when the pubescent media warned of a new ice age, the Salvias would have withered long before the Thames froze at the edge of the Garden and London's citizens took to the ice at the Frost Fairs.

All of this means that the effect of climate change on the Inner Temple Garden enables us to grow a wider variety of plants over a longer period, but the most spectacular outcome is the flowering of our *Dahlia imperialis* in the High Border. It originates from Central America, is a 4.5m tree-dahlia with thick bamboo-like stems, and we are probably the only garden in the country to have it flowering out of doors. As they say in football – 'result'!

TEMPLE CHURCH ORGAN FUND

For most visitors to the church, the organ is merely a collection of the twenty or so pipes that are visible from the chancel. In reality, it is a mammoth instrument containing around 3,500 wooden and metal pipes ranging from 32-ft in length to just a few inches, set into wooden soundboards.

Over time, wood warps, leather perishes and electrical wiring deteriorates; metal buckles, dirt falls into pipes, and thousands of small and intricate parts – often not accessible on a regular visit – have to be checked and repaired or renewed.

The commitment of the Inns to regular maintenance and tuning visits has enabled Harrison & Harrison to keep the Temple Church Organ in fine working order. However, the instrument now

needs a major – and expensive – overhaul. This must be done every forty to fifty years when the whole instrument must be dismantled, transferred to the organ builder's workshop, thoroughly cleaned, repaired and then reinstalled in the church. Every pipe will then be expertly voiced and regulated. This is a task of gigantic proportions, and will take place over a period of eighteen months between 2011 and 2013. A temporary instrument will be installed in the interim. The organ should sound again in the Temple Church for Easter 2013.

The sum which is needed for this major, and crucial work is £750,000.

We hope that through the generosity of those who have attended and loved the Temple Church and its music, as well as through those who may come to recognise the value and history of this beautiful and numinous place, future generations will benefit from and enjoy this remarkable instrument.
