THE STAFF OF THE INN



SUB-TREASURER'S TERMS OF REFERENCE - 1682

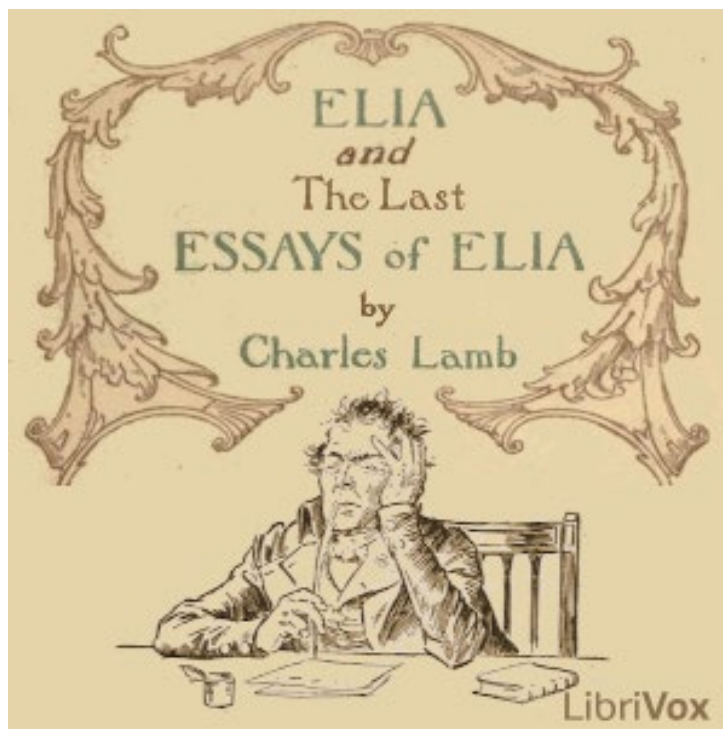
- **To receive all the Inn's rents, revenues and casual profits of the society (aside from the Steward's Rolls for Commons) and dispose of them by order of the Treasurer.**
- **To give the Treasurer in the first and last weeks of term an account of moneys received.**
- **To give Bench Table an account in the first week of each term of all members who refused to pay their arrears of duties.**
- **To receive a roll of the Chief Butler's accounts every Michaelmas and Easter term (with copies going to the Treasurer and Head Butler).**
- **To oversee contracts for work done or goods bought by order of Bench Table or the Treasurer (or the Senior Bencher in his absence) and to account for these to the Treasurer.**
- **To give good security with three sureties to the value of £2000 for due performance of this duty and true discharge of his account.**

SUB-TREASURER'S REMUNERATION – 1682

- **Poundage of 12d in the £ on all monies received by him for the use of the Inn.**
- **20s from each gentleman admitted to the Society under certificate from an Inn of Chancery.**
- **A convenient chamber during the execution of his office, without attracting Commons.**
- **£5 out of the Treasury every term.**

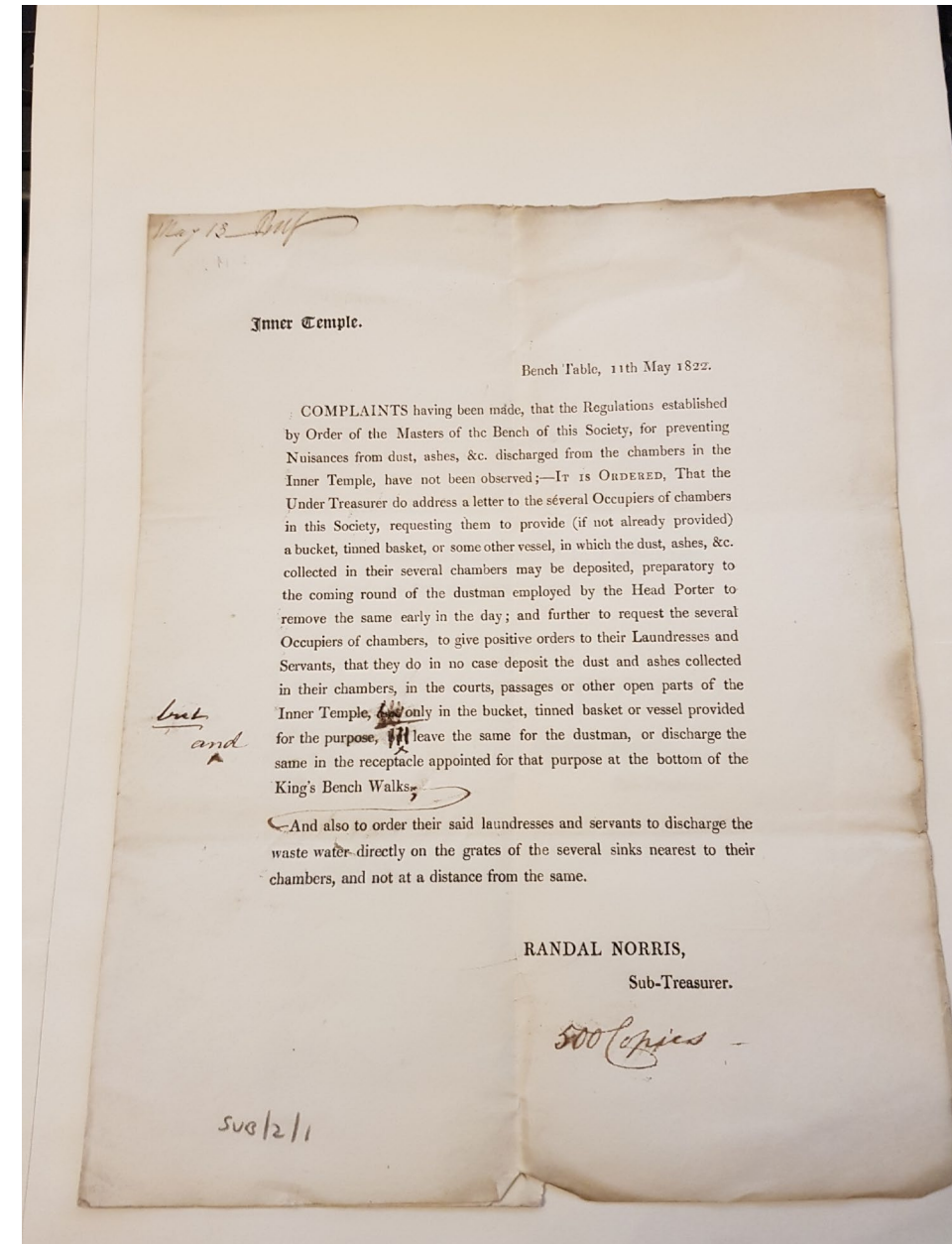

The Duties of the Sub-Treasurer are, amongst others, these, viz.:—

- To attend the Treasurer's Office during office hours.
- To attend the Bench on business days and all Committees. To bring before them the business to be transacted. To take Minutes of their proceedings, and draw up the Orders made thereon.
- To receive all Moneys paid into the Office, and dispose of them, as ordered by the regulations of the House.
- To check, according to the regulations of the House, the Collector's accounts of Moneys received by him for Rents and Commons.
- To examine and check the Wine Accounts and the Cook's Accounts for Commons.
- To examine and Check all Tradesmen's Bills (except repairs).
- To pay Salaries, Allowances, &c., &c., throughout the year.
- To superintend the keeping of all the Accounts of the Society.
- To attend to all the details, and enforce the observance of all the Forms connected with Admissions to the Inn, keeping of Terms, Calls to the Bar, and payment of Dues, &c., to the Society.
- To see that the Officers and Servants of this Society perform their respective duties.
- To take care that the Temple is properly watched and warded.
- To conduct all Correspondence on the business of the Society.
- To enter into a Bond with Sureties in the sum of £4,000.

The future Salary of the Office will be £550 per annum.

*MEMORANDUM as to the Office of Sub-Treasurer
of the Inner Temple.*

The Sub-Treasurer will be required to devote the whole of his time to the duties of his office, which include (under the Treasurer and Masters of the Bench) the general management of the affairs of the Society and the supervision of all their Clerks and Servants, and which also include the duties of "Overseer," such as the making of the Valuation Lists for Rating purposes, and the duties of the "Sanitary Authority," &c., under the "Public Health London Act 1891," and other duties under the Statutes relating to the Temple.

If however he should be appointed Secretary of the Joint Committee of the Four Inns on Duties, Interests and Discipline of the Bar, he will have to discharge the duties of that office.

The Salary of the Sub-Treasurer will be £700 a year. No prospect of any increase is held out.

He will not be entitled to claim any pension or retiring allowance, nor to receive any other emoluments in respect of his office except such salary as may be paid to him as Secretary of the said Joint Committee, if appointed.

The engagement may be terminated by three calendar months' notice at any time by either party.

The Sub-Treasurer will be required to give a Fidelity Guarantee to be approved by the Society.

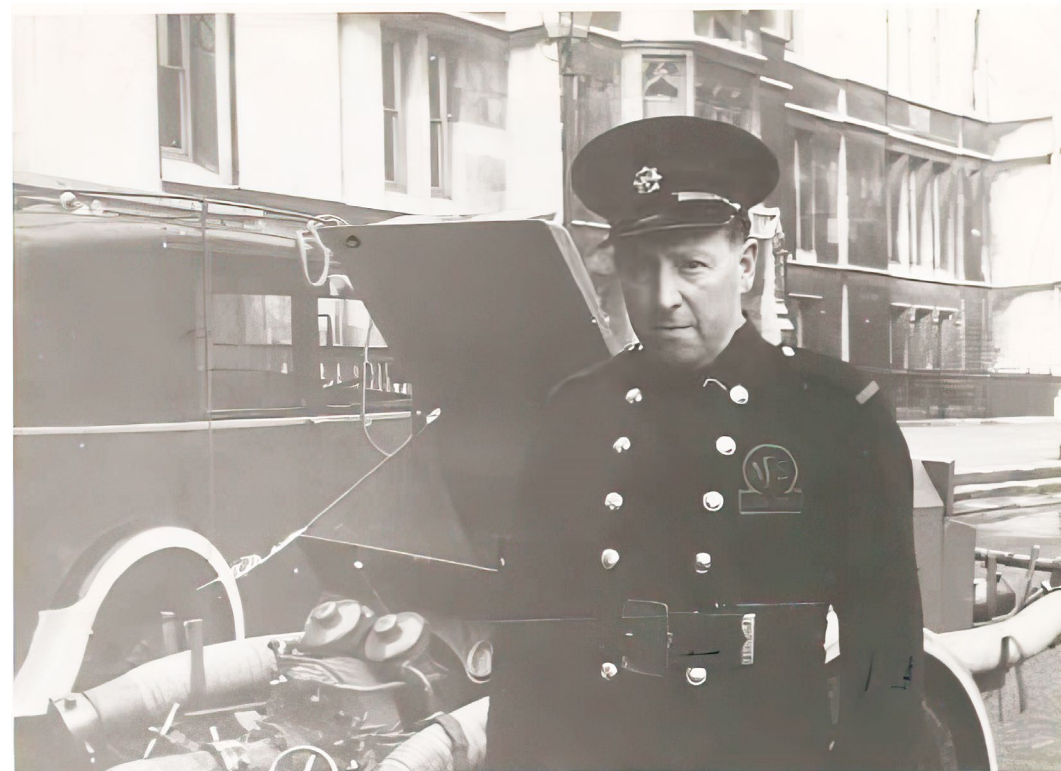

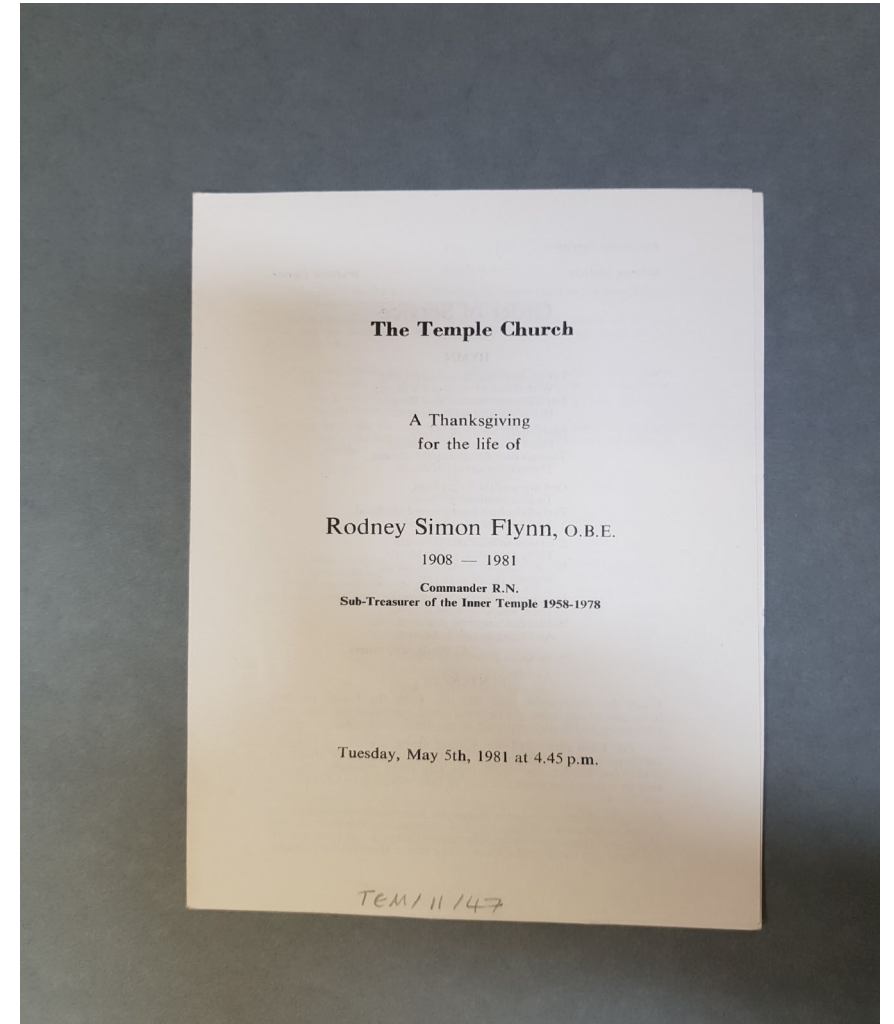

SALARIES OF SUB-TREASURERS MID-18TH TO LATE-20TH CENTURIES

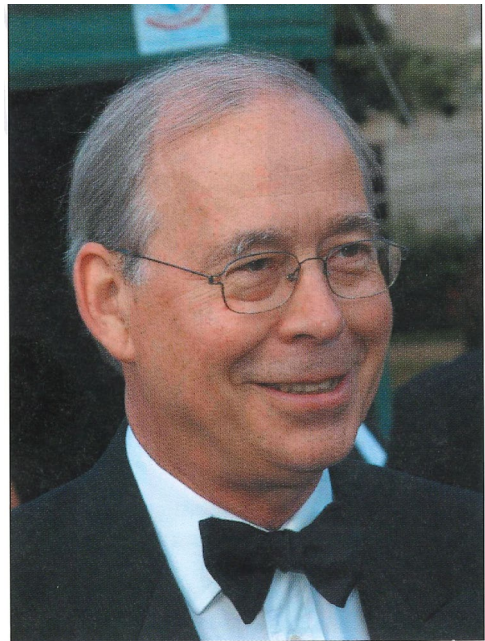

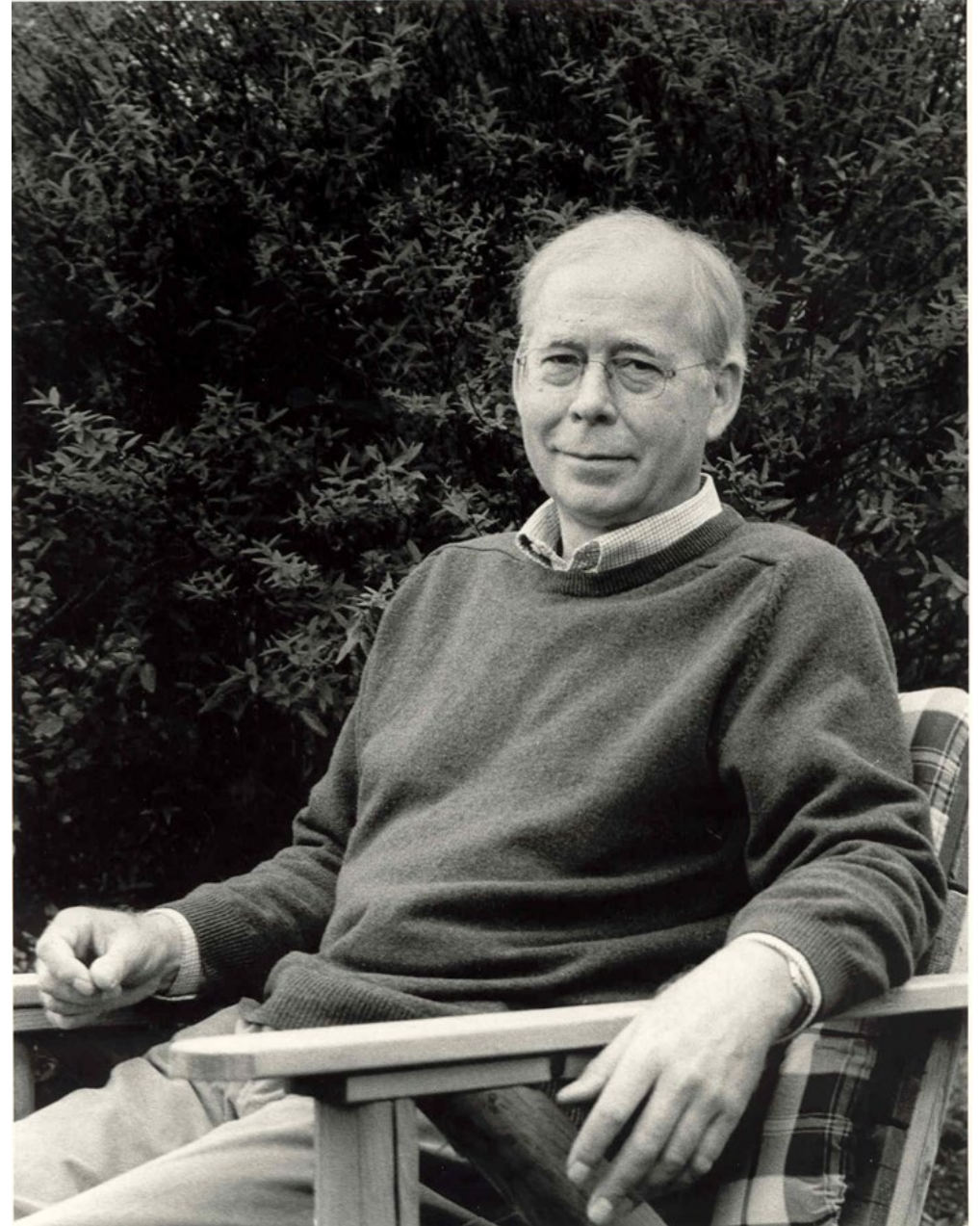

BENCH TABLE ORDERS

INNER TEMPLE BENCH TABLE ORDER ON THE ROLE OF SUB-TREASURER

- **On a vacancy in the office of Sub-Treasurer the Bench shall appoint his successor on the recommendation of the Treasurer and the Executive Committee. Such appointment shall be made at Bench Table and confirmed by Parliament...**
- **The Sub-Treasurer shall attend every Parliament and Bench Table and Executive Committee meeting and shall make a minute of the business there transacted. If the Sub-Treasurer is unable to attend, the Sub-Treasurer shall with the consent of the Treasurer arrange for a senior member of the staff of the Society to attend and make a minute.**
- **The Sub-Treasurer may, after consultation with the Treasurer and with the Master of the Bench or the Chairman of the Committee or Sub-Committee responsible for a particular department's activities, engage on behalf of the Society such staff as are necessary to conduct the business of the Society.**
- **The Sub-Treasurer shall supervise the members of the staff of the Society and report to the Treasurer or to the relevant Master of the Bench or Chairman of a Committee or Sub-Committee referred to in the preceding paragraph of this Order any breach by them of their duties**
